Nebraska Sheep and Goat Conference

2023 Annual Conference

Almost thirty sheep and goat producers attended and participated in the annual Nebraska Sheep and Goat Conference held at the Cobblestone Hotel and Conference Center in Broken Bow on Saturday, September 9th. A terrific line-up of speakers addressed a variety of production managements, wool uses and products, and current issues relative to small ruminant operations.

A general summary of the speakers and their topics include Michael Gibson from the Nebraska Department of Agriculture presenting information regarding state preparedness for major disease outbreaks and suggestions for operation bio-security measures to reduce possible exposure. This information was followed by Harold Johnson, of Hyannis, Nebraska, who shared photos and information of his Nebraska Spanish and Boer goat operation. He shared management tips as well as explanation of his breeding and management programs.

Dr. Becky Funk, DVM, a Nebraska Extension Veterinarian, Teaching and Education Specialist, added to Mike's presentation of bio-security awareness as well as sharing general sheep and goat management practices to be applied on individual operations. She responded to numerous questions from participants.

The next two presenters shared very informative programs regarding wool use and this aspect of sheep production. Kelsey Patton, owner of The Fiber Mill of Stromsburg, Nebraska, passed around samples of various yarns and wool products from her business. Kelsey explained how to add value to wool, the steps involved with fabricating wool into a usable product, and the many uses of wool into fabric and garments. She was followed by Andrea Nisely, Nebraska Make It With Wool (NEMIWW) Director. Andrea explained the MIWW program and her leadership with the Nebraska program and the national competition. To further demonstrate the program and its success she included this past year's Senior Division national winner, Saidi Ringenberg from Lexington, Nebraska, to model her national winning wool outfit and several other clothing items, outfits, skirts, and coats she has made from wool. Along with Emma Olson, who modeled her National Jr. Division fourth place wool outfit, Julia Nicholson modeled her wool garment from last year's state competition.

After a pizza lunch, John Hay, from UN-L Extension Solar Grazing, provided information regarding the use of sheep for solar farm vegetation management. He included insights toward contract inclusions that addressed responsibilities and opportunities for sheep producers to take advantage of this growing energy development. John was followed by Dr. Allison Crane, the Wyoming Wool Growers Executive Director, who shared an explanation of taking, understanding, and using carcass ultra-sound techniques and data. She also provided a live demonstration ultra-sounding a few animals.

Jeff Ebert, Kansas Sheep Association, representing the American Lamb Board and the American Lamb Council, provided an update on national American Sheep Industry programs. He preceded Randy Saner, Lincoln County Extension Educator, who shared the advantages of co-grazing goats or sheep with beef cattle on pasture.

The evening meal featured roast lamb, roast beef, and fried chicken with all the fixings. During the meal Randy Saner was presented the Ted and Alice Doane Award. This honor is presented annually to an individual who has contributed major efforts toward sheep and goat emphasis in Nebraska. The dinner entertainment was provided by R.P. Smith of Broken Bow, who shared humorous and thoughtful cowboy poems. A silent auction had been conducted throughout the day to generate funds toward a Nebraska sheep or goat youth activity. Items such as wool-knit products, various signs and pictures, a creep gate, and gift buckets of useful items were included for attendees to bid on. The top bids were announced at the end of the meal. The sheep movie And Now Miguel was shown as the final group social activity prior to

prsons retiring for the evening.

The annual association business meeting and initial discussion of Lambing/Kidding Clinics for early next year was held on Sunday morning as the final activity of this very informative conference provided for sheep and goat producers of Nebraska.

Randy is an Extension Educator for University of Nebraska –Lincoln Extension in Lincoln Logan and McPherson Counties, responsible for agriculture education focusing on Beef Systems.

He grew up on and cattle ranch near Dunning Nebraska and attended Sandhills public Schools before attending The University of Nebraska-Lincoln receiving his Bachelor of Science in Animal Science and Agriculture Education and a Master of Science in Monogastric Nutrition.

Before returning to Nebraska, Randy worked for the University of Missouri Extension as a Regional Livestock Specialist for 15 years. He also worked for Colorado State Cooperative Extension as an Extension Agent in Weld County, Colorado.

Randy assumed the responsibilities as the statewide expert in goat and sheep production. Randy has gone the extra mile in serving as an ex officio on the Nebraska Sheep and Goat board. He helps the group organize their meetings and educational programs. He has helped with 10 Lambing and Kidding schools 19 4S Goat Expos and Over 30 different presentations on sheep and goat production.

He has written a Nebraska Guide Sheet on Goat Production in Nebraska and developed a website on Sheep and Goat Production for Nebraska Extension.

Awards received are Nebraska Extension Chester I. Walters "Extra Mile" Award, the MU Extension Team Work Award, National Association of County Agricultural Agents (NACAA) Achievement and Distinguished Service Award, NACAA Communications Direct Mail Piece 2nd Place National Winner, and the MU Extension Association Meritorious Service Award.

Some of the programs he is involved with are: West Central Cattlemen's, Tri-State Cow Calf Symposium, UNL Beef Lab, 4-H Youth Development serving 3200 youth, Lambing and Kidding Schools and 4S Goat Expo.

He has held various offices in Missouri Extension and the University of Nebraska Association of County Agricultural Agents.

The ASI Annual Convention is the one time each year when all facets of the American sheep industry come together to discuss topics that are timely and important to sheep producers, lamb feeders, as well as those working in the meat, wool and sheepskin sides of the industry.

"As always, we're putting together an exciting program of events at a first-class venue," said ASI Executive Director Peter Orwick. "We encourage anyone with an interest in the industry to register and attend as we work through the business of our association, educate leaders on important topics ranging from marketing and government policy to sheep health and genetics, and network from the farm and ranch to the traders and processors."

Orwick is planning a panel discussion on the Farm Bill for the opening session on Jan. 11 and expects to draw Congressional leaders and staff for a timely discussion on passage or implementation of this critical legislation for agriculture.

Four tours will be offered during the convention as attendees will be able to choose between two traditional industry tours:

One industry tour will include stops at the Superior Farms lamb processing plant in Denver and Harper Feeders in Eaton, Colo., with a bit of a twist. This is your opportunity to gear-up and walk through Superior Farms' plant to see everything from processing to fabrication. Attendees will then travel to Harper Feeders to learn about how lambs are managed at this third generation 65,000 head capacity feedlot. Attendees will have the opportunity to see first-hand implementation of the Secure Sheep and Wool Supply Plan at each location. Attendees will hear about the lessons learned in preparing these operations for an FMD outbreak and the steps taken to minimize the effects on their business and the sheep industry.

The other industry tour will include stops at Colorado Lamb Processors' lamb processing plant and Rule Feeders in Brush, Colo. This is your opportunity to gear-up and walk through Colorado's newest lamb processing facility. Following the plant tour, attendees will visit nearby Rule Feeders.

The Seed & Smith Grow Tour offers a 40-minute guided grow tour of a state-of-the-art cannabis cultivation facility. During your tour, you will have the opportunity to look behind the curtain at how cannabis is grown, harvested, extracted, processed and packaged. This engaging, all-inclusive tour shows you the cannabis process from beginning to end. The tour will take you through four stops: the Vegetation Room, the Bloom Room, the Packaging Pit Stop and the MIP. At the conclusion of the tour, guests will find themselves in the Marketplace where they can get advice from expert cannabis associates on different items.

The Golden Historic Tour heads west from Denver to the foothills and offers a visit to Red Rocks Amphitheatre, which is a naturally formed,

world-renowned outdoor venue famous for its star-studded concert roster, natural acoustics, and incomparable ambiance as well as its awe-inspiring hiking and biking trails. You will learn about the history of the amphitheatre, the unique geology and look out at stunning views. Next, you'll enjoy a scenic drive to Lookout Mountain. Your tour guide will share stories of the outrageous lives of the gun-slinging Buffalo Bill Cody and Annie Oakley and visit Buffalo Bill's gravesite overlooking Golden and the Front Range. Finally, the tour will head down the hill to Golden. The city of Golden was established at the foot of Lookout Mountain in 1859 as prospectors searched for gold in the Colorado hills. This quaint town is the home of the Colorado School of Mines, Miller-Coors Brewery and historic buildings.

Convention attendees are encouraged to register for tours early as participation is limited and spots will fill up quickly. The National Western Stock Show & Rodeo will also be going on during ASI's time in the city.

Meetings of ASI's councils and committees are open to all convention attendees. And once again in 2024, the Genetic Stakeholders Committee is joining with the National Sheep Improvement Program and Sheep Genetics USA to host a genetics forum that promises to be educational regardless of your role in the industry. Issues Are Not Always Black & White



ALB PROMOTES AMERICAN LAMB THROUGH CONSUMER AND INFLUENCER

The latest consumer research funded by the American Lamb Board (ALB) indicated that a majority of consumers associate lamb with flavor, tenderness, freshness and quality, but only 33% of consumers agree that lamb is a nutritious meat choice. Building awareness about lamb's nutrition benefits and positioning lamb as part of a healthful diet and lifestyle is an opportunity to increase consumer utilization of American Lamb.

Most recently, ALB's nutrition education campaign added new strategies to foster a love for lamb with nutrition influencers and consumers through nutrition information delivered through a virtual consumer-facing workshop, an inaugural healthcare professionals ranch tour, participation at the Food and Nutrition Conference Expo (FNCE).

CULINARY MEDICINE VIRTUAL WORKSHOP

On September 19, Sabrina Falquier, MD, CCMS led a virtual consumer-facing workshop hosted by ALB titled, "How American Lamb Fits into a Healthful American Diet,".

This nutrition workshop educated consumers on the nutritional benefits of lamb and how to incorporate principles of culinary medicine into eating patterns.

Culinary medicine, a relatively new term in the world of healthcare, combines the science of medicine and nutrition with the art of cooking. For the consumer, this translates into the healthcare team discussing how food affects health and actionable ways to incorporate a healthier diet. For example, the doctor might provide recipes, cooking tips, or a cooking class to help improve health ailments such as diabetes or heart disease.

During the ALB workshop, Dr. Falquier brought lamb and culinary medicine together, demonstrating two recipes highlighting different cuts of American Lamb, American Lamb Shakshouka and Blended American Lamb Burger. The American Lamb Shakshouka, utilizing loin, highlighted the Mediterranean Pattern 9 Point Scale by incorporating additional healthful ingredients such as olive oil, vegetables, legumes, dairy, complex carbs from the potatoes, and American lamb. The Blended American Lamb Burger, utilizing ground lamb, focused on a Culinary Medicine concept known as the 'Protein Flip'.

"The 'protein flip' means we are using American Lamb and adding vegetables (mushrooms and beans) within the patties themselves," says Dr. Falquier. "By adding these ingredients to the burger, we are including more fiber, vitamins, minerals and plant-based protein."

STEWARDS OF THE LAND RANCH TOUR

To educate influential health professionals on how American lamb is raised and how our farmers and ranchers care for the land, the ALB hosted six leading health professionals—five registered dietitians and one physician-for the inaugural "Stewards of the Land" ranch tour.

The "Stewards of the Land" ranch tour took place in Tomales, California, at Pozzi Ranch and Stemple Creek Ranch on September 20-22 where guests learned first-hand from American lamb ranchers about how sheep are used to improve the quality of the land they graze by cycling nutrients back into the soil, minimizing erosion and encouraging native plant growth, all while helping

What a summer! Challenges and blessings. Now comes fall and all too soon, winter. Leaves turning, frost, crop harvest, roundups, and all the getting ready for the months ahead.

The Nebraska Sheep and Goat Producers Association hosted a terrific Annual Conference in Broken Bow in early September! Lots of information and ideas to consider were presented. The first silent auction raised over \$800 to be used toward a youth activity involving sheep or goats.

This event was preceded by State Fair tasting of lamburger meatballs and goat cheese samples. Followed by the 4S Goat Show in North Platte near the end of September. Many more sheep and goat activities to check into this fall with the Fiber Fair in York and the Nebraska Make It With Wool competition coming up in Hastings.

The association has begun discussions to conduct two Lambing/Kidding Schools in late January or early February, with one to be held at each end of the state. Many tips can be gained from these clinics regarding nutrition, health, facilities, and management. Watch Facebook and the state NSGPA website for more details in the near future.

A special opportunity coming up for sheep producers is the national American Sheep Industry Convention to be held in Denver, January 10-13. Programs and speakers addressing issues and topics relevant to production will be presented along with the opportunity to tour a couple sheep processing plants. This occurs during the National Western Stock Show, so the case can be made to include both events during these activities so close to Nebraska.

For my operation this summer I have had the request to supply sheep to graze various cattle corrals and suppress the weeds therein. This greatly helped my forage needs as my typical summer grazing in eastern Nebraska and Kansas was short due to droughty conditions. Marketing opportunities have arisen to market lighter weight lambs that ended up going to Pennsylvania. A reduction of corn prices in late summer should improve my bottom line for the lambs I have kept to feed out for traditional market weights. And market prices are holding steady at more normal ranges this fall.

As I attended sheep meetings this summer and fall, I found several new producers, and a few with expansion plans, and some planning to try accelerated programs. (Also visited with a few cutting back reluctantly.) There is interest in sheep production. Joining the Nebraska Sheep and Goat Producers Association and attending the various schools presented, can answer questions and provide ideas toward success with this production interest of sheep and goats. I would also encourage you to bring along a friend that might have an interest or investment with sheep and goat enterprises to attend the clinics and to become part of this industry group as we address your interests or needs.
